





Modals/ will/ shall/ should/ can/ could/ may/ might/ must/ had to

Main auxiliary verbs (be, do, have)



Present

Be

Past

am, is, are

Singular

I am
You are
He is
She is
It is

Plural

We are You are

They are

Subjects: I, you, he, she, it, we, and they.

"You" is singular or plural.

After the subject, the verb "<u>be</u>" changes to <u>am</u>, <u>is</u>, or <u>are</u>.

was, were

Singular

I was
You were
He was
She was
It was

Plural

We were
You were

They were

I am a teacher

We are people.

You <u>are</u> students.

He **is** a man.

She <u>is</u> a woman.

You <u>are</u> a student.

They <u>are</u> workers.

I <u>was</u> in my classroom yesterday.

You were there, too.

He <u>was</u> at a movie last night.

She was at home.

We <u>were</u> at school yesterday.

You were on this website earlier.

They **were** outside in the snow.

It <u>is</u> an apple.



Do **Past Present** did do, does Singular Plural Singular Plural I do We do I did We did You **do** You did You did You do He did He does She does They do She did They did It did It does

The verb "do" can be used to make a statement:

I **do** my homework every weekend.

...but it is usually used to make the present tense or the past tense negative:

I don't have any money. (present)



Do

It's also used when making questions:

Do you know what time it is? (present)

Does he have a coat? (present)

Statement: I wear glasses.

Negative: I <u>don't wear</u> glasses. Question: <u>Do</u> you <u>wear</u> glasses?

The past tense form of "do" is "did".

Examples:

I <u>did</u> the dishes last night. She <u>did</u> her grocery shopping at Cub. "Do" is often used as a main verb, but only for particular activities, such as housework, cleaning, studying, research, and shopping.

Examples:

I <u>do</u> the dishes every night. (do = wash)
She <u>does</u> her grocery shopping at Cub. (do = go/finish)
They <u>do</u> their homework at the library. (do = complete)

Hint: The verb "do" is very important, therefore we will study it comprehensively later.

"Have" is usually used for ownership, ability, or for a description....

- ❖ I have a new car.
- **They have** time to go to the movies.
- ❖ She **has** brown eyes.
- ❖ He **has** a beard.



Have

...but the word "have" is also a very popular substitute for the words "eat" and "drink."

- ✓ She <u>has</u> coffee every morning.
 (She <u>drinks</u> coffee every morning.)
- ✓ He <u>has</u> pancakes for breakfast.
 (He <u>eats</u> pancakes for breakfast.)

For past Tense

When I was a child I had a dog.

Hint: The verb "have" is very important, therefore we will study it comprehensively later.



Negative & interrogative

He **drinks** some water He **does not drink** some water

He **walks** 10 miles everyday He **does not walk** 10 miles everyday

He **drove** his car carefully yesterday He **did not drive** his car carefully yesterday

She **wrote** a letter yesterday
She **did not write** a letter yesterday

He **drinks** some water **Does he drink** some water ?

He walks 10 miles everyday Does he walk 10 miles everyday?

He **drove** his car carefully yesterday **Did he drive** his car carefully yesterday?

She **wrote** a letter yesterday Did she **write** a letter yesterday?



shorting answers

Are you going to the beach? Yes, I am

Have you finished your meal? No, I haven't

Does she live in London? No, **She doesn't**

Did they like the present? Yes, they did

Will you come with me? No, I won't

Can you swim? Yes I can
