Example:

There isn't a calendar on the wall.

There aren't any photos.

We use any with questions and negatives.

Example:

Are there any book in the bag.


There aren't any photos.

Example



9.1 Was/Were

Was and were are the past of am/ is/ are.

Present positive

-I am happy.-They are at work.-You are a student.

Past positive

-I was happy yesterday.-They were at work last week.-You were a student in 1990.

<u>Negative</u>

Was+ not → wasn't

Were + not \longrightarrow weren't

-She wasn't at home last weekend. -I wasn't at school yesterday.

Question

-Where were you born?

-Was she at home? Yes, she was./ No, she wasn't

*We use was/ were with born, not am/is/are.

-Where was he born?

-When were you born?

9.2 Past simple- Irregular verbs

We convert verbs from present tense to past tense by adding(ed) the verb, but there are many verbs convert to past tense without add (ed), these verbs called irregular verbs. Many irregular verbs shown below:
