

Simple Future Tense

Positive

The simple future tense is used to describe an action that happens once in the future.

Will / Shall + Verb

EX.

He will start his new job in March.

We will travel to Europe next summer.

The concert will begin at 8:00 PM tonight.

I will call you when I arrive.

She will cook dinner for us tonight.

They will buy a new car next month.

He will learn to play the guitar in the coming months.

We shall move to another city

Negative

- The negative simple future tense is used to express actions or events that will not happen in the future. It's formed by adding "will not" often contracted to(won't) before the base form of the main verb.
- EX.
- I will not go to the party tomorrow.
- She will not finish her homework on time.
- They will not travel abroad this year.
- He will not attend the meeting next week.
- We will not buy a new car until we save enough money.
- The restaurant will not close early tonight.
- I will not forget your birthday.
- She will not lend her laptop to anyone.
- They will not take the job offer.
- He will not watch TV all day.

Question

- The question simple future tense is used to form questions about actions or events that will happen in the future. It's formed by rearranging the word order or by adding a question word before the auxiliary verb (will).
- EX.
- Will they travel to Europe for vacation?
- Where will he go for his summer internship?
- Will we have class tomorrow?
- Will it rain tomorrow?
