Simple Past Tense

In past tense, the verb after the subject is in the past. Moreover, these adverbs (yesterday, ago, last year, last week) refer to past tense.

According to the following basic:

Subject + verb (ed)

- Kate drove her new car carefully yesterday.
- Bob went to the market <u>last week</u>.
- The girls left the city two days <u>ago</u>.

<u>Future Tense</u>

In future tense, the verb after (will, shall) is bare verb. In other cases, (is going to) is used to refer to the future tense. Moreover, these adverbs (tomorrow, next year, next week) refer to future tense.

According to the following basic:

Subject + auxiliary verb + base verb (will, shall, is going to)

- His mother is going to change the room decoration tomorrow.
- The child shall toddle more <u>next month</u>.
- The family members will travel around the world <u>next year</u>.
