

# “How to Make a Question”

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- "Is it cold outside?"
- "Are you happy?"
- "Can you drive a car?"
- "Will you be working tomorrow?"




"It is cold outside"



**"Is it cold outside?"**

-Start the sentence with “do” or “does” when the auxiliary verb “to be” is not in the sentences.



- ◉ Does Kate win the challenge? 
- ◉ Do Charlie and Pam cook together often? 
- ◉ Did Kyle play soccer yesterday? 

“Charlie and Pam cook together often”



“**Do** Charlie and Pam cook together often?”



## Ask “what” or “which” to ask about things.

to ask  
about  
things

**What** do you want to do?

**Which** is your favorite?

- What is your favorite flavor of ice cream?
- Which museum would you like to visit today?



# Use “where” to ask about locations

- For example, “Where do you want to meet for lunch?”
- You could also ask someone, “Where are you from?”

to ask about locations

**Where** do you want  
to meet for lunch?

Form a question with “who”  
to ask about people.

to ask about people

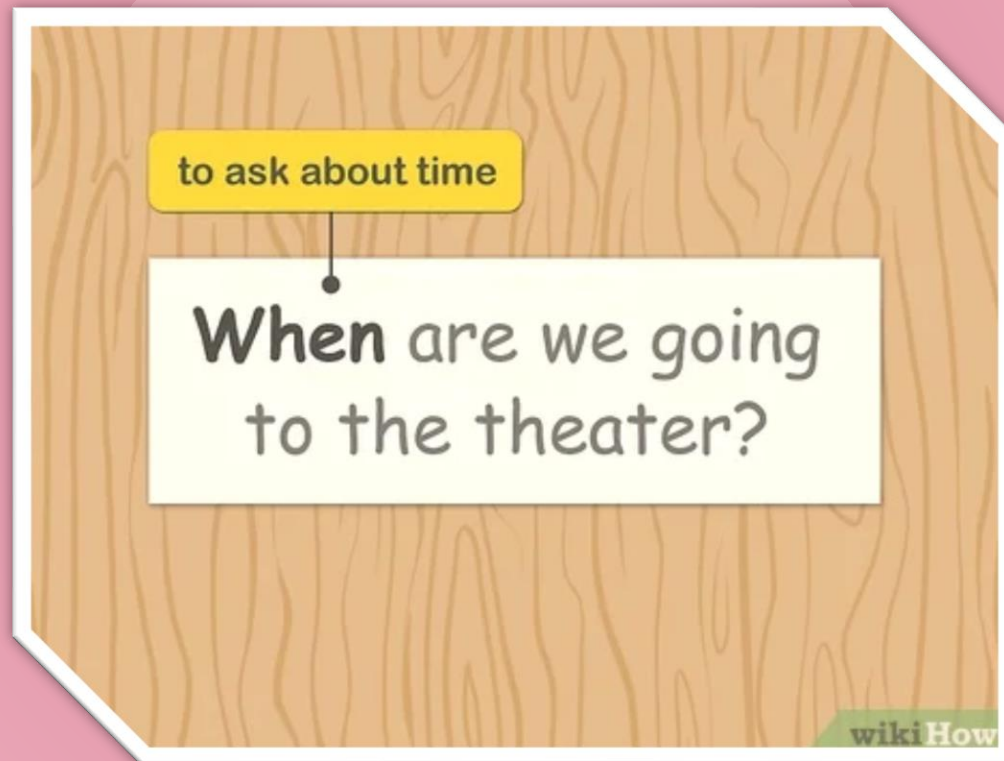
Who is the manager?



“Who will pick me up to go to the  
airport tomorrow?”  
To find out the name of the person.

# “When” to ask about time

E.g. When are we going to the theater?



# Use “how” to ask about a process.

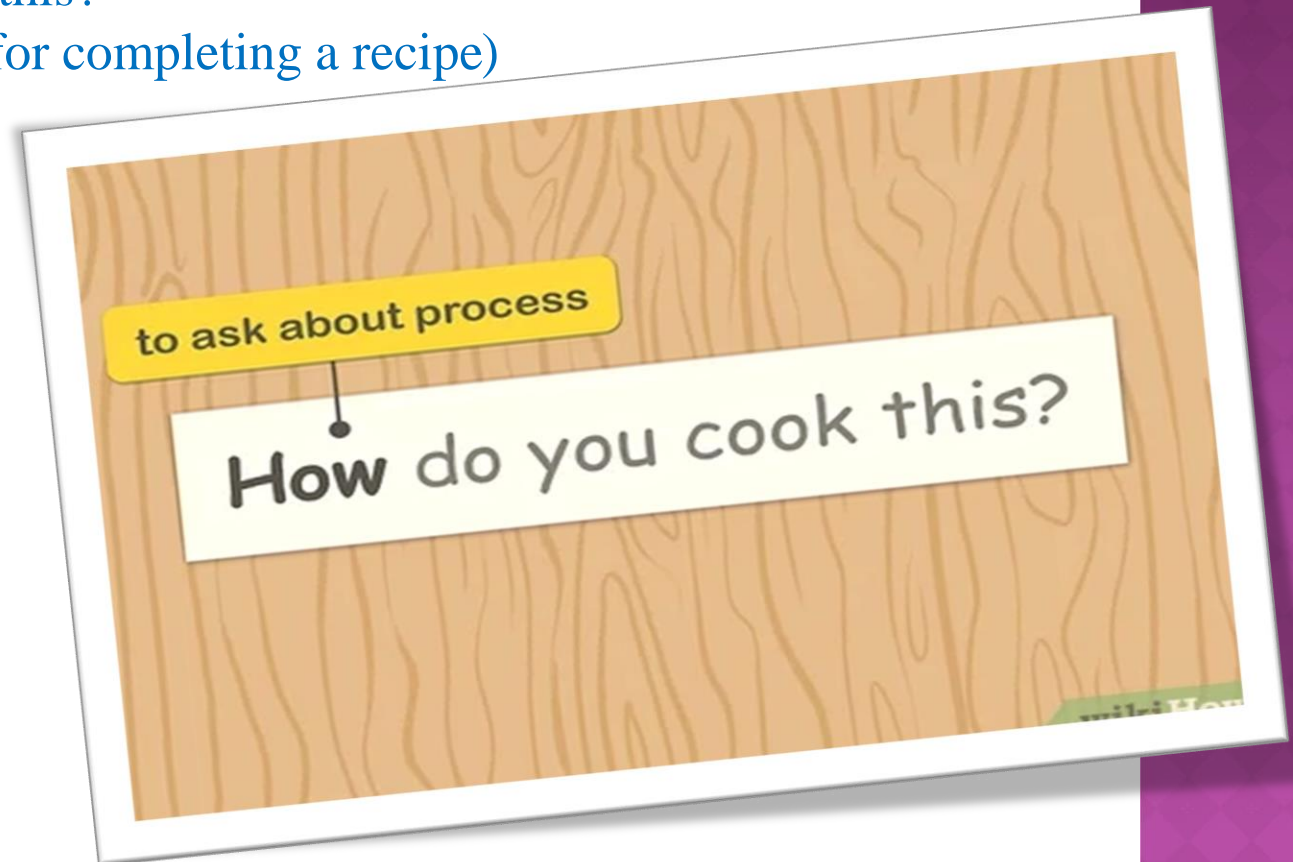
## Examples:

- “How do you get to the university?”

(to get directions.)

- “How do you cook this?”

( to get instructions for completing a recipe)
